Plagiarism

- Merriam-Webster defines plagiarism as "the act of using another person's words or ideas without giving credit to that person"
- You may not quote any lectures word for word to answer a homework or exam question
- You may not quote a homework solution to answer an exam question (you will be allowed to bring posted homework solutions to each exam – but all answers to exam questions must be in your own words, you are not allowed to put quotes of others, including from lectures or homeworks)
